Brother Morris "Morry" Hecker '46 7/20/22 – 3/3/19

We recently learned of the passing of Brother Morris "Morry" Hecker '46. A lifelong resident of Champaign, Morry died peacefully in his home late Sunday evening, March 3, 2019.

Born in Burnham Hospital on July 20, 1922, to Morris L. and Bess Stipes Hecker, Morry went on to marry Martha Zearing in 1950, and she preceded him in death in 2007.

Morry attended Champaign public schools and entered the University of Illinois in the fall of 1940. His college career was interrupted by World War II in 1942 when he enlisted in the Navy and was called to active duty in 1943.

After the war, Morry finished his U of I education and graduated from Harvard University's Business School with an MBA degree in 1948. He returned to Champaign to work with his cousin, Royal (Rooney) Stipes '27. Their partnership in Stipes Publishing has over the years brought other family members into the fold and continues today.

Morry was known for his quick wit, humor and, at times, sarcasm. He enjoyed traveling with Martha and his family.

LEGENDARY WATERING HOLE

What does the future hold for the iconic campus bar?

Commencement 2019 could mean the end of a long era for Kam's.

In August, 2018, the Champaign-Urbana News-Gazette reported that Kam's, the campus bar popular with generations of Greek students, had been sold by owner Chris Meyer to a group including Scott Cochrane, who owns several other campus-area bars. Chris Meyer had owned the bar since 1991. Prior to that, it was owned for decades by Delt alumnus Jack Kamerer '64, and his family.

After taking ownership of Kam's in August, Cochrane said there would be no major changes to the bar.

By December, however, rumors had surfaced that the entire 600 block of East Daniel street would be redeveloped as an



apartment complex. All the current stores, including Kam's, C.O. Daniel's and Espresso Royale, would be torn down to make way for the construction. Those rumors have since been confirmed, however, no announcements have been made about the fate of Kam's and the other businesses along Daniel St. Meanwhile, demolition is set to begin this summer.

In January, a popular social media account, Illini Barstool, posted drawings on its online platforms of a proposed new Kam's (pictures at left), which would be located on the northeast corner of First and Green St, but Cochrane denied rumors that a new Kam's will be built. Cochrane acknowledged speculation regarding the future of the bar, but said that nothing has been confirmed.

The First and Green location would put Kam's in close proximity to many new developments along Green Street as well as an area referred to as Seniorland, where Greek members rent houses and blocks of apartments together during their last year on campus. Seniorland is located south of Green Street between First and Oak streets.





CHAPTER HISTORY

Beta Upsilon Origins

Beta Upsilon has a long history at Illinois. While going through our archives, we came upon the official history of Delta Tau Delta at UIUC. Here is an excerpt in which the history of the first house is detailed.

"Beta Upsilon did not occupy a house until 1900. As was the practice with University of Illinois fraternities, the chapter rented a meeting hall. The chapter hall was located on Main and

Walnut streets, Champaign, on the second floor of a building which housed and was owned by the First National Bank. The chapter moved to its first house in 1900, a rented property at 410 E. Green, Champaign. Very little was recorded about that particular house, but there are photographs of it in the Illio. It was, though, the house in which the longest of all Delt traditions was begun—carving fireplace bricks. The available records don't indicate how the tradition started, but most contemporary Delts say every member who lived in the house




at least five semesters carved their name into a brick in the fireplace.

Fundraising for a new home, though difficult, was no doubt made easier by the increasing strength of the active chapter. By 1909 the chapter boasted thirty active members. The centerpiece of the chapter's activities was an annual alumni dinner (or, as prominent alum Louis M. Tobin '01 usually termed it, the "love

feast"), usually held in late April or early May. The chapter began several annual traditions during this period, some of which survived for many years. Annually, around Christmas, the pledges put on a Christmas dance, and, in addition to the annual Halloween party, some of the actives performed a play for the chapter's amusement. The 1907 playbill featured 'Blotches of Blood: or Pursued by Percy Cauliflower,' described as the legitimate successor to 'Gobs of Gore.' The chapter also held frequent dances and parties, as well as a winter formal."
